#### **Barley Parish Council**

**Telegraph Poles** – if BT Openreach have their way the Forest of Bowland in our area will be repopulated with telegraph poles. The first I knew of this plan was whilst driving home from Clitheroe, I was surprised to see around 25 poles standing proud on Barley Lane from the layby down to the village and there were also other poles radiating down the access roads to smaller communities.

I say standing proud, what I really mean is large, 9m high wooden poles with cables hanging from them that are blighting the open vistas in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and many more are planned to arrive at your door soon.

The government has made a commitment to deliver superfast broadband to rural communities and the vehicle is BT Openreach. The vast majority of rural people will be delighted to receive this service having suffered a limited, unreliable and slow internet service for years. The Parish and the Borough Council realise the benefits to residents and businesses and fully support this initiative.

However, this needs to be balanced against the need to ensure that our landscape is not blighted by over 100+ telegraph poles and their linking cables radiating to all properties in the area. The plans show poles erected all the way up to Upper Ogden, Stang Top and Whitehough etc. Whilst Barley is important to ourselves, the area around Pendle Hill is a nationally important tourist area attracting around a third of a million visitors each year, largely because of the outstanding and unspoilt landscape.

Planning legislation would normally control this form of development in the AONB in the form of the need to apply to PBC under a prior notification procedure. However, a Permitted Development Order 2015 specifically excluded telegraph poles from needing any form of consent - provided they are for broadband and the development is completed prior to 30<sup>th</sup> May 2018. Hence few new about this and the haste to progress.

Since the first poles were erected there has been a lot of activity involving LCC (funding the project using government monies), PBC, AONB representatives the PC and BT. Discussions are ongoing on how to progress this important project and where cables can be put underground which is of course reliant upon landowners, access and cost.

Whilst the PC is being held on the periphery we are optimistic that much can be done to reduces the impact on the area. During this consultation phase BT have suspended all pole erection work and have told me they will be removing all poles on Barley Lane once they have an alternative solution.

The issue does of course raise the dilemma that if poling is not acceptable in the AONB (and this is very old technology) and it is not possible to put cable underground in private grassland or on public maintained highway i.e. grass verge, then it may prove impossible to provide Superfast fibre broadband to certain premises in the area and so views will be diverse. However, we all know there is an alternative village broadband service available to us which continues to improve in reliability and speed. It would be a calamity to erect poles to a remote property which does not require the BT option.

I would like to thank Newchurch and Roughlee PC's for their support on this issue.

#### Goldshaw Booth Parish Council

I would like to start this article by wishing residents a happy New Year and hope that the Parish Council continues to meet its challenges and provide a good service to everyone.

At the last PC meeting recently, Cllr. James Starkie reported on the plans for the installation of more telegraph poles to be erected in the local area by BT for high speed broadband connection. He has been in touch with Pendle Council and LCC to have the connections, where possible, provided by laying cables underground rather than on rows of poles. All agreed that more poles would spoil the affected landscape, which after all, is part of the AONB. The PC gave a formal confirmation of support and wished him well in his endeavours.

The playing field has been affected by flooding for some time now, which has been caused by a blocked land drain. It was so bad that it was difficult to walk along the main path at the side of Sparable Wood and action needed to be taken. Happily the Parish Council is able to call on public spirited individuals who have the skill and patience to deal with a problem like this. Alan Taylor, who many will know, has been kind enough to volunteer and has managed to identify the blockage and at the time of writing this piece, has stopped further flooding. The field should now start to dry out, and although the job is not yet finished, I am confident it will be soon.

The pond in Sparable Wood is continuing to take shape and there is now a bench that is permanently sited and has been provided by Jim Tunstill who is the main driver behind this project. Michael Astin continues to make his regular inspections of the play equipment which is a necessary and important responsibility to ensure safety for the public. I have written about these items to show that it is the work of volunteers who have been good enough to undertake them and because they have a sense of a shared community. On behalf of the PC I thank these volunteers for their involvement and I hope that other people are encouraged to come forward and offer their help for other jobs and projects that need attention.

Residents may have been wondering if we were ever to be provided with a speed indicator device (SPID) that has been talked about for a long time now. The PC heard from County Councillor Christian Wakeford about the reasons for the delay and that an order has definitely now been made. My thanks go to Christian for all the hard work he has put into this project and hope, probably as much as he does, that we should receive the SPID sometime next month.

The Council reviewed current levels of service and decided not to increase the precept for 2018/19, which will in effect result in a small decrease in the amount paid by the tax payer.
