Curate's Thoughts

In school this week, I asked the children what they would like to pray about. It didn't come as much of a surprise that the word on all their lips was "Ukraine". At their prompting we prayed for peace, for safety for the people of Ukraine, that they have enough food to eat and water to drink, and that we can help them. All very much as I would perhaps have expected.

But then, out of the silence, a 7-year old voice piped up:

"Lord, please don't let the war get any bigger, as we don't want World War 3. Amen."

Amen, indeed. For me, this was a truly heart-stopping moment, reinforcing how much this terrible and pitiless war - taking place over 1,500 miles away - is affecting us and touching us personally. In under a month it has come to dominate all our thoughts and prayers, even those of a 7-year old in rural East Lancashire.

Noticeably absent from their prayers, however, was one set of people, people who need our prayers as much as anyone else. And those are the aggressors – by which I don't just mean the Russian soldiers, sailors and airmen, but also their leaders, their Generals and Admirals and, yes, even President Putin himself.

Back in the darkest days of World War 2, CS Lewis – best remembered today as the author of "The Chronicles of Narnia" but also a noted theologian – wrote about the difficulty of praying for one's enemies:

"When you pray for Hitler and Stalin, how do you actually teach yourself to make the prayer real?"

He suggested that there were two things that helped him. First, he constantly remembered that in praying we are "only joining our feeble little voice" to the ever-lasting involvement of Christ, "who died for those very men". Because we can be in no doubt that Christ is there; he is not simply standing back, watching cruelties being inflicted from afar. He's there in the bombed-out cellars of Mariupol; the shattered hospitals of Kyiv and Kharkiv; He's bringing comfort to the wounded, the dying, the homeless and the dispossessed. It was for this very purpose – to share our pain and ease our suffering – that God took on human form and suffered the cruellest of deaths on the cross. And in rising from the grave on the first Easter morning, He gave us hope to sustain us through the darkest of days.

Secondly, Lewis faced up to the uncomfortable truth that each and every one of us has the ability to be cruel and to sin. He argued that, under different circumstances, any of us might have developed into "something terrible" – another Stalin, a Hitler, a Putin. He concluded that, at bottom, we are not "so different from these ghastly creatures". It's a truly sobering thought that, in praying for our enemies, we are also praying for ourselves and what we might have become, had things been different:

Merciful Lord,

We pray for the people of Ukraine, for all those suffering or afraid, that you will be close to them and protect them.

We pray for the leaders of every nation, that you will guide them in the ways of freedom, justice and truth.

We pray for our enemies, and those who wish us harm, that you will turn the hearts of all to kindness and compassion.

We pray for the wounded and the captive, the grieving and the homeless, that in all their trials they may know your love and support. Amen.

The Newchurch Park Access-4-All project is progressing well and provides the opportunity to consider areas of Communal Garden. Already we have the fruit trees which the Community planted in the Park last year, plus we have donations of blackcurrant, gooseberry and rhubarb ready to plant. At the next meeting we will be looking at the Community's wants and needs for vegetable gardens, herbs, wildflower areas and potentially bee hives. Feel free to let us know your thoughts and ideas, either at the meeting or through the Goldshaw Booth Parish Council FB page.

We will also be looking at introducing educational elements to the Sparable Wood area and potentially working with St. Mary's school to complement their Forest School projects.

As part of the Community projects we are looking for volunteers to help paint the Newchurch Park play equipment which is remaining (in readiness to complement the new equipment) and to help create the Communal Gardens etc. - all in exchange for tea and cake! Thank you to residents for observing the dog ban in Newchurch Park. Based on representations made by the Community last year, the Parish Council voted to protect the Park area for children (in-line with other play areas), and to retain dog access to Sparable Wood and the Football Pitch areas. The refurbishment of Sparable Lane has made walkers access (and the avoidance of the park for dogs) much easier.

Pendle Hill Landscape Partnership

The Pendle Hill Landscape Partnership is now in its final year of operation, but we still have lots to do and news to report on.


We are very aware of the increased number of visitors to Pendle Hill, particularly since Covid. One of our objectives has always been to 'spread' this pressure around the wider landscape and to offer activities and opportunities for visitors and residents in areas and villages other than just Pendleside.

To this end, we're producing a new printed walking series: 'Walking the Pendle Hill Landscape'. The new series includes 12 new routes graded from easy to difficult which explore the villages around the hill as well as 5 routes to the summit. The new series aims encourage visitors to think about an alternative route to the summit or be inspired to try a valley or village walk with wonderful views of the hill.

The new series will be in print from Easter 2022. It can also be viewed on our project website and via the Outdoor Active app now!

We have also been busy planting trees and hedgerows this spring. Volunteers helped at two local farms in Roughlee, planting hundreds of hedgerow plants. In addition we created over 800m of new hedge near Higham and laid over 150m at Overhouses Farm. This will all have a really positive impact on the landscape and wildlife of the area.

We have also continued with a woodland management scheme for United Utilities up at Ogden Reservoir over the winter: improving the woodland for wildlife.

Barley Parish Council

I have been covering Covid in the newsletter since CV started so an update is due. Travel restrictions have been removed in the UK, there is little regulation left (only guidance) and so if you have it, there is nothing to stop you going out and about and spreading it – except your conscience. No surprise then that Im cases were officially reported last week plus those who did not bother reporting. Of course, the good news is that for those vaccinated it should be no more than a bad cold; it was for me recently. However, for some it will be acute and for others chronic with long covid a proven reality, so as I have said before, still be careful out there.

Spring weather is about and as mixed as ever. Last weekend we had temperatures of nearly 20°c and at the time of writing it is snowing. Along with the daffodils and the blossom we have a new addition to spring this year – Valais blacknose sheep. They are a Swiss breed providing wool and the occasional home for mint sauce but most of all they are good lookers so watch out for them, but beware they have a vicious bite!

The Council considered a planning application to develop Cross Lane Farm at our last meeting; this is the white house on the rhs as you climb the hill to Newchurch. It has a prominent position overlooking Barley and is one on the most visible properties in the area. The application is to almost double the size of the existing dwelling and for the extension to be predominantly glass.



Whilst the building is probably in need of renovation there will be some considerations for the borough councilor's planning department to make.

I have just attended a meeting of the Barrowford & WP Committee at which the waste tipping at Boothman Wood and the related road flooding were discussed. The outcome was not wholly conclusive but the matters are now on the Borough Council's radar.

The process of introducing parking enforcement on the turning circle is still painfully slow but enforcement signs have now been erected (they are covered by bags) and we are awaiting the delivery of supporting IT equipment. Similarly slow burn for resident parking.

Please be aware that the annual Pendle Fell race will be held in the village on 2nd April.

Finally, the Council would like to congratulate one of our members, Daniel Goldsbrough, on his upcoming engagement to Louise. Best wishes to you both.

Roughlee Parish Council

An ongoing problem relating to parking at school drop off and pick up times has been the subject of a meeting attended by representatives of the school, of the Parish Council and the immediate residents. The problem is not unique to Roughlee School and there are no easy answers. Various ways of improving the situation were discussed and a follow up meeting has been arranged for 31st March to progress matters.

As reported in last month's news, the Luncheon Club has been reinstated with a different format. A community lunch will now be held at 12.30, every other Thursday, at the Bay Horse. The price for a two-course lunch is modest and local villagers of pensionable age will benefit from a small Council subsidy. Details of dates and prices are available from Adam at the Bay Horse. The lunches so far have been well attended and enjoyable.

Future relationships between the Parish Council and the Village Centre Committee (VCC) are being formalized to clarify responsibilities but the work of the VCC continues to make a huge contribution to the social life of the village and to local charities. Of particular note was the sum of £4,356 raised for Pendleside Hospice from the Pub Walk event at the Village Centre. A further charity event is planned on the evening of Friday 29th April and all day on Saturday 30th April. This will take the form of a Beer and Gin Festival with proceeds going to the British Heart Foundation and to Cancer Research. It will also serve as an opportunity to remember Brian O'Sullivan and Paul Dainty, both long standing stalwarts of the VCC who sadly died in recent months.

The Parish Gathering is held annually and is an opportunity for villagers to hear, first hand, about the work of the Parish Council and to enjoy presentations on topics of interest, for example the local history of Roughlee. The Gathering normally concludes with a social get-together over a glass of wine. This year's event is planned for Monday 20th June at 7pm so please make a note in your diaries. So far we plan a presentation on the Sky at Night but the Parish Council would welcome ideas for topics of interest from local people. Please let us know if you have topics you would like us to address.

Walking and Cycling Survey



Everyone is invited to take part in a survey to help shape future plans for cycling and walking in Lancashire.

Lancashire County Council wants to join up the gaps in our existing network of footpaths and cycle routes and provide safer, direct and more convenient routes.

Working in partnership with Blackpool Council, they are developing Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans, providing long term solutions for our future cycling and walking networks throughout Lancashire.

A plan will be produced for each of the following seven geographical areas of the county; Central Lancashire, Ribble Valley, Hyndburn and Rossendale, Burnley and Pendle, West Lancashire, Fylde Coast and Lancaster. The Fylde coast plan will include Blackpool alongside Fylde and Wyre.

To help the council, they are asking for feedback from across the county on current cycling and walking provision in their area. They want to know what the gaps are in the network and what facilities would enable people to walk and cycle more.

The survey will be available on the council's website until 5 May 2022.
