The Vicar's Letter

Dance then wherever you may be

Music has been around for centuries. The major events of our lives both as individuals and as part of a wider community are so often accompanied by music. There is a song for every occasion be it a cause for joy or sorrow. Some things seem to go together and where there is music there is often dancing.

Seventy five years ago on May 8th there was dancing in the streets as explained by English Heritage In towns, cities and villages throughout England, people marked the victory on 8 May 1945 by taking to the streets to celebrate with singing and, of course, dancing. As recalled in Melody Maker's account of the revels: 'From one end of the country to the other, people, relaxing after nearly six years of the most terrible anxieties wanted to dance'. The Lindy Hop was the dance craze of the day. (English Heritage Website).

To mark the anniversary English Heritage was going to send professional dancers to every county to lead the nation in dancing the Lindy Hop. As with so many things those plans have been put on hold and instead of dancing at street parties and other events, we will need to be more inventive under the current restrictions.

We will still be able to dance and sing on VE day by dancing the Lindy Hop and singing We'll Meet Again but it may be in our homes with our immediate family or on our own but there is something wonderfully uplifting about being part of something even if you can't see the other people doing it.

We are not told in the Bible if Jesus ever danced but many of us will be familiar with the hymn Lord of the Dance written by Sydney Carter (1915-2004). Lord of the Dance presents the whole of God's plan of creation and redemption as a dance. It begins 'in the morning when the world was begun' and ends with the cross and resurrection.

During May as we continue to ponder the meaning of the resurrection of Jesus you might like to think about your favourite hymns. When we can gather in church what would you like to sing?

Each year at Easter Classic FM radio produces a list of the top 300 classical songs as voted for by the public. It would be lovely to produce a top twenty of songs/ hymns that sustain us in difficult times and then gather to sing them. Please do let me know your top three by phone, letter or email.

In the meantime remember that we can all continue to make a joyful noise unto the Lord in our homes which can be places of worship (temple) and carry on dancing where ever we may be as if no one is watching whilst safe in the knowledge that God is always with us and doesn't care if we can't sing a note or have two left feet he will guide us through the joys and sorrows of this world and the next.

I write this article with a view to a historical record of where we are in late April'20 that we might reflect back on in the future

We first heard of Coronavirus in November 2019; it had broken out in China and seemed to be a bad cold that could be serious for some but it was on the other side of the world. Far away in a place called Wuhan which we had never heard of and we did not think it would be an issue for the UK.

By mid-March some were starting to be concerned but the government agreed to the Cheltenham Festival going ahead, but about the same time the football authorities were suspending all games for the foreseeable future.

By 18th March schools were closed followed by pubs and restaurants on 20th March by government decree. Social distancing was part of our vocabulary and the way most of us lived. A kind of lock-down was put in place and life had changed, we all followed the news as they focused on CV19 deaths and the lack of testing and PPE availability. The Pendle Inn, the Barley Mow and then the Cabin closed

Barley PC closed the car park on 21 March and cones and signs were set out in the village to discourage visitors. Many signs started to appear around the area directing none residents to go home and not visit the area — seemingly supporting the government message to stay home, protect the NHS and save lives. Protecting the local residents is an admirable intention but rural communities, like everyone else, are relying on the new "essential workers" who live in Burnley, Colne and Nelson in large numbers and provide us with medical and a host of other necessary services.

Through the lock down in April the weather has been great and it has been so unusual to see the village devoid of visitors, just like the 1960's I am told. At times it all seems a bit eerie and certainly very quiet apart from Thursday evening when we all come out to cheer the NHS – thank you to Lee Hunt who videoed this event last week using a drone and made copies available to us all through Facebook.

DiY is keeping many busy and most gardens have no weeds but we wonder if we will be able to get bedding plants as most nonessential businesses are closed

The Parish Council did not meet in April due to social distancing rules but the Council will hold a virtual meeting using electronic communications if an important matter does arise. Guidance has recently been issued to Councils on how to conduct such meetings and we will probably have to give it a try before the lock down ends. We may use the resident email list, the Residents Facebook page and the notice boards to alert you to any important event.

For now, we hope you can all keep safe and remind anyone that is struggling to get in touch with a Councillor if you are in need of any assistance or support.

This News is being written shortly after a further three week lock-down has been announced which means we will continue to be restricted until at least the end of the first week in May. What happens beyond this is still highly uncertain but I am sure that we are all longing for something like a return to normality.

In the first few weeks of the restrictions it is pleasing to note that people in the village have been following Government guidelines and our countryside is very quiet. The unauthorised blocking of some local footpaths appears to have been resolved and local people are able to take much needed exercise.
