



Curate's Thoughts

Whilst I'm on holiday, I enjoy seeking out some of the more unusual customs that flourish in the area I'm visiting. This summer I came across a particularly strange one. Every ten years most of the people in the village where I was staying stop cutting their hair for 18 months; in addition, the men stop shaving. Not at all good if you're the local barber. And it makes crowning a Rushbearing Queen or two opposite the public conveniences in Newchurch every summer seem pretty well normal behaviour.

But if I now reveal that the village in question is called Oberammergau, the reason for the unkempt hair and beards may become obvious. It's part of their vow to perform a passion play in thanks to God for delivering their village from the plague that was sweeping across Europe almost 400 years ago. Not that it's an unchanging custom: the text has changed radically over the years and the decree against hair-cutting only came into force in the 1960s!

The idea of communities coming together to perform a play to tell the story of Christ's Passion can trace its origins back to the 13th Century. Which means, passion plays are relatively recent inventions compared with the custom of rushbearing. The earliest reference I've found to our custom goes way back to the 9th Century when Pope Gregory IV directed that "rushes should be strewn on the floors of the churches on their saints days".

Back then, it was an intensely practical thing to do. Most buildings, including churches, had floors made of compacted earth. The rushes soaked up any water that seeped through; they provided insulation against the cold; they also some sweet smells to offset the more obnoxious ones; and, when they became just too grotty to carry on, they could easily be replaced.

What was new about Gregory's edict was linking this very practical act to a church's saint's day. In effect, making it an ecclesiastical festival; part of the annual celebration of the church's very existence within its community; part of saying thank you to God for all he has provided over the past year – and all he will provide in the year to come.

There was also something intensely symbolic about the custom as it originated. The taking out of the old rushes and their being replaced by new ones; things change but they also remain the same. There's a continuity to life, which is emphasised by this annual process of renewal.

bears only a passing resemblance to those early days, just as today's Passion Play in Oberammergau bears only a passing resemblance to its medieval forebears. We don't have earthen floors in the church anymore. So there is no practical reason for scattering rushes on them.

Instead we have symbolically, an old Rushbearing Queen passing on the title (and the crown) to a new one – or, this year, to two new ones. Change has occurred, yes, but continuity has been preserved. And with it comes renewal and a fresh beginning for all of us.

Rushbearing is undoubtedly an occasion to have a bit of fun, to put on pretty dresses, to parade through the village, to celebrate the past. But it remains more than that. Because unchanging through it all is our need to say a big thank you; a thank you to God for all he has provided for us and all he will continue to provide.

Whatever you are doing this Summer and wherever you may be going, may I wish you well and hope that you too may come across some unusual local customs!

As I am writing, the drainage works on the Village Green are well advanced and whilst the project is going well the rain forecast for the next few days might slow things down. Once the drains are completed the footway across the green will be improved with drainage channels installed and a new footpath surface. The last part will be to turf over some of the damaged grassed areas and you can bet that it will stop raining once the turf is laid. There will also be some environmental works on the embankment above the village green including tree planting and bird boxes.

The project has had financial support from the Lancashire Environment Fund which we are grateful for and Pendle Borough Council have provided some welcome technical support to the design of the scheme, that has been a big help and played a part in securing the grant funding.

Parking charges were introduced on the Turning area from 1st July. So far it has been a success with the turning area mainly free of vehicles during the day and providing its



primary function for a range of vehicles seeking to turn, has prevented congestion in the village centre and re-established the village centre piece. To date there has been six parking charges issued.

Up on Heys Lane, the adjacent landowner has completed some damage repair works to the lane that were required by LCC before they would sanction essential maintenance work to the centre section of the lane. These will now be progressed by the PHLP using their funds. The Council are lobbying for some drainage works on the incline above Bridge End to prevent wash-out in front of the properties and hopefully some wall repairs.

Hurray - In July 2021 I reported to BT that the manhole in front of the noticeboard by the VH had partially collapsed and was a hazard. They duly turned up a week later and put a small red fence around it which you have most likely seen over the last twelve months. After many e-mails and a few phone calls it was repaired last week-twelve months in the planning stage.

Other matters in brief, we have not made the final of the Best Kept Village competition this year, the planning application to extend Cross Lane Farm was rejected and can I request that you have a word if you see dog fouling around the WI garden not picked up.

Finally, I am sure everyone will join us in wishing Jess Kirk and Jack Thompson health, wealth and happiness following their wedding at Stirk House. And we all wish Cllr. John Connor a speedy recovery following a few days in hospital.

Barley Chapel has been at the heart of village life for the past 122 years.

It has weathered many storms. Many of you will have fond memories of Harvest festivals, Carols by Candlelight, Barley to Bethlehem, weddings and christenings at the Chapel.

Not to mention the wonderful shows, birthday parties, toddler groups, table tennis and of course FOG club. The chapel has been there for us all in some way or another and stands as a reminder of times gone by.

The congregation at Barley has fallen because of many changes in our daily lives, and most recently due to Covid resulting in the chapel facing extreme financial difficulties and potential closure. With your help this can be averted.

Unfortunately, we have uncovered major problems with the chapel roof which needs to be addressed in order that the building continues to be functional for generations to come.


