

## **Curate's Thoughts**



It used to be said that everyone knew where they heard that President Kennedy had been shot. That's no longer true of course, given that the majority of people alive today weren't even born on 22nd November 1963. But there are plenty of more recent examples that are seared onto the national or international consciousness. I suspect that most of you reading this can remember what you were doing when you heard that Diana, Princess of Wales, had died in a Parisian underpass – or where you were when the first plane hit the World Trade Centre in New York.

There will always be moments when time seems to pause; when a full stop is written into history before moving on again; when the past is broken from the future; when life is changed forever and there's no possibility of going back.

It remains to be seen whether the death of Elizabeth II will become one of those defining points in our national timeline – only history can judge. But time and again over the last few weeks, we've heard commentators tell us that everything has changed. Antonio Gutteres, the Secretary General of the United Nations, for example, described her as "an anchor of stability across decades of ... turbulent history." I like that description; much better than those who spoke of her as being unchanging, fixed or permanent. Yes, Queen Elizabeth was a constant presence, offered us continuity and stability, but unchanging – far from it.





The late Queen had an amazing gift to change and adapt without you really noticing. For taking tradition and moving it gently forward. It's only when you look back over that amazing 70 year reign that you can see how far she – and we – have travelled. Occasionally she was on the backfoot, but more often she's been at the forefront of change, opening up the Monarchy in a way that her predecessors would never have imagined possible, nevermind desirable.

From the brilliant coup of letting the television cameras into Westminster Abbey for her coronation, it's an unbroken line of innovation and change right through to the livestreaming of her lying in state. Can you honestly imagine the 26-year old Elizabeth, with her cut-glass vowels and perfect poise, welcoming James Bond into Buckingham Palace and then parachuting into the Olympic Arena? Or inviting Paddington for tea and revealing the contents of the royal handbag to him?

No, Queen Elizabeth's life was one of constant change, not of simply standing still and letting things wash around her. Only two things were constant throughout. One was her love for the dashing naval Lieutenant she married in 1947 and the second was her faith. Her faith never wavered, whether the times were good or it was an "annus horribilis". Her daily routine of prayer and bible reading, her regular attendance at divine worship. Those, together with her marriage, were the true constants in her life her fixed points – no matter how busy her schedule became. Hers is an example, from which we can perhaps all learn.

In recent years, there was talk of a possible abdication, standing aside to let Charles take the throne. But to do so, would have been to break the oaths she made at her coronation and which she swore before God: to govern her dominions in accordance with the law; to uphold Justice and exercise Mercy; and to profess the Gospels in her role as Supreme Governor of the Church of England. Vows she kept unto death.

The late Queen was a shining example of someone who saw the Lord Jesus Christ and who believed in him; who ate the bread of life and was never spiritually hungry. Just

as she kept the vows she made before God, He will keep his promise to her - and to all who truly believe.

Her earthly remains have now been laid to rest beside those of her beloved Philip. And together they will continue their journey in God's eternal Kingdom. Words Her Majesty said during the pandemic were used during her funeral service and remain equally apt today:

"We can take comfort that, while we may have more still to endure, better days will return: we will be with our friends again; we will be with our families again; we will meet again."

God save the King.

## **Barley Parish Council**

The passing of Queen Elizabeth II on 8th September probably made most of us stop in our tracks and brought some sadness to us. We have seen much of her life through TV and, for most, her devotion to the country was an inspiration; it was for me. There is a village book of condolence in the entrance to the Chapel if you wish to sign it and thank you to those who erected a temporary flagpole on the turning area. This enabled the village to fly the union jack at half-mast as a sign of respect during the national period of mourning. The Council are considering erecting a permanent flagpole.

Works have commenced to improve the lower section of the car park and when completed, it will match the upper section. Drainage is being installed and kerb channels laid to identify the parking areas and provide support to the new asphalt roadways. There is no drainage on the upper section of the car park and so it has been necessary to install a number of gullies, and connecting pipes, to help remove rainfall from the parking areas and roadways. The lower section of the car park is currently closed and the works should be completed by the end of October.



The village green project is now completed including the environmental works on the embankment. You have all seen how quickly the new grass has grown – the resident volunteers who prepared and seeded the area must have been green fingered. The Council were pleased to see the first cut of the grass undertaken last week and the protective fences and tape removed from the area. Over the next couple of years, we will now be able to undertake further works to improve the quality of the grassed areas.


The application for Resident Parking in the village centre took another step forward in September with the informal consultation process completed, over 90% of residents and businesses supported the proposed scheme. We now move forward to the LCC formal consultation period in October.





Works have commenced on Heys Lane and ditches are being excavated and drains laid to keep water off the surface in the future and crushed stone is being laid along the middle section of the lane to even out the track. Some sections of stone wall have been re-built, mainly by local people who volunteered to try their hand at wall building under supervision of a stone mason.

The Council have been working with Park with Ease as our car park management partner for just over 18 months. The Council has recently reviewed the contract arrangements and decided to extend the contract with them and agreed to a small increase in commission costs to reflect the rise in prices that all businesses are facing.



Finally, it is with sadness that I report the passing of Kathleen Mullholland. She was once well known to many in the village centre and lived at the big white bungalow opposite the village green. She was an author who published a number of novels and in 1990 she published a book called "A Cry of Innocence"; a tragic novel giving a vivid account of the lives and betrayal of the Pendle Witches.

Our condolences are with her family and friends.




### **Pendle Patchers**



Barley Chapel has been at the heart of village life for the past 122 years.

It has weathered many storms. Many of you will have fond memories of Harvest festivals, Carols by Candlelight, Barley to Bethlehem, weddings and christenings at the Chapel.

Not to mention the wonderful shows, birthday parties, toddler groups, table tennis and of course FOG club. The chapel has been there for us all in some way or another and stands as a reminder of times gone by. The congregation at Barley has fallen because of many changes in our daily lives, and most recently due to Covid resulting in the chapel facing extreme financial difficulties and potential closure. With your help this can be averted.

Unfortunately, we have uncovered major problems with the chapel roof which needs to be addressed in order that the building continues to be functional for generations to come.

We can apply for grants to fund the work but as part of the grant process we need to evidence that the chapel building is not only used for worship but for community purposes as well. ## **Goldshaw Booth Parish Council**


As the nights draw in and the temperature drops we are tempted to curl up and hibernate - which isn't at all bad..... as long as we can put the heating on!

# Pendle Hill Landscape Partnership



### **Heys Lane Restoration Project**

Update on Heys Lane restoration works

At long last the works on Heys Lane have now begun, indeed by the time you read this

they may have been completed.

Our first job was to restore some lengths of dry stone wall alongside the lane through the woods. The walls had become neglected in some stretches, they were very low, with many stones and toppers having rolled down hill. They did however, have good foundations and some enormous 'throughs' and topper stones which cover the whole width of the wall.

Over the course of a week we ran two 'Taster Days' under the expert tutelage of Alan Rhodes from Dry Stone Walling Association, and 15 local people had a go at this ancient craft.

We also invited back volunteers who had previously trained with us over the lifetime of the PHLP scheme,

and a good number of them turned up and gave in total 23 days of their time. Together we completed 40 metres of wall. (photos attached)

The contractors then moved in. They have been improving the drainage channels along and across the lane to reduce flooding on the surface of the level stretch. They have also removed the layers of leaf mould and soil that have accumulated and got down to a

more solid stoned surface. Hopefully walkers and horse riders will see the difference over the winter and in wet weather.

All this work has been carried out on behalf of Lancashire County Council, the highway authority responsible for the lane (which is classed as a Byway Open to All Traffic, or BOAT); and authorised by the local Rights of Way officer, Tom Partridge. The contract has been managed by PHLP and funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.
