The Vicar's Letter



As I write this it is six days till Advent Sunday, the beginning of a new church year. Advent is the time when we prepare for Christmas. Twenty- twenty has been a difficult year across the globe and as we approach Christmas people are naturally concerned for the future and concerned about Christmas itself and how it will be celebrated.

During the first national lockdown I watched more films and TV than usual and I'm reminded of two of them now, Robin Hood Prince of Thieves and the original Star Trek series.

In Robin Hood the Sheriff of Nottingham famously shouts, 'Call off Christmas' and many people quote Dr McCoy from Star Trek saying, 'It's life Jim but not as we know it'

Christmas has not been called off or cancelled. To misquote Dr McCoy this Christmas will be Christmas but not as we know it.

Many celebrations this year including Easter were different. We may not like the changes but we learnt to adapt, to find new ways of being the church, serving the people of God and sharing the gospel message.

In the words of St Paul in Romans 12:15 this Christmas more than the church will need to, 'Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep.'

At St Mary's we will aim to celebrate together in church if we are able but through the Church of England's Christmas campaign Comfort and Joy we will seek to embrace the wider community that wants to join in the celebration but may not be physically able or emotionally ready to do so.

Christmas 2020 will be different but when we light the final candle on the Advent wreath in our homes and churches on Christmas Day that light will shine brightly reminding us that Jesus is the light of the world that St John writes about in the opening chapter of his gospel used during Christmas services.

'The light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it' (John 1:5 NRSV)

May that light shine on you this Christmas and forever.

Whilst at the time of writing we are in the middle of the November Covid 19 lockdown with restrictions on meeting people from other households, pubs and many shops forced to close and a national concern regarding the damage caused to the economy and our social well-being – along comes some great news announcements, like buses, three effective CV19 vaccines are looking likely to be available by January. It is also likely families will be allowed to get together over the Xmas period. Things suddenly look better for 2021 but till then – stay safe everyone.

The car park and toilets have remained open during the November lockdown whilst they were closed during the first CV lock down in March. The Council thinking has been that there are no restrictions on travelling locally to exercise so people could come to Barley and it was felt better to have them in the car park than around the village. Whilst visitor numbers do surge on sunny weekend days, with many businesses still operating, schools open and winter weather dominating the visitor numbers are generally much lower over a week than back in March before restrictions on all travel were introduced. I doubt if there are any public car parks closed due to CV19 during this lock down period.

That said, the surge in visitor numbers on sunny days causes traffic problems and the Council have now persuaded the County Council to introduce passing places on Barley Lane and Barley Road. The location and format is currently being considered.

Whilst we have few parking issues in the village, mainly down to the success of the CV19 signs encouraging visitors to park outside the village, we still have inconsiderate visitors occasionally parking on the white lines and the pedestrian crossings around the Village Hall area creating hazards for all. The Council have agreed to make further representations to LCC to have the white lines changed to yellow lines in these areas.

Whilst the Village Hall is closed the Village Hall Committee have been looking at the condition of the building and putting together a programme of repairs. The timber floor in the down stairs main hall was in a very poor condition and so a few weeks ago the floor was removed and replaced with a concrete slab floor costing over £8k. The works are now completed and the floor has now cured and the Parish Council were pleased to be involved in funding the works. Further works are needed to tackle some damp problems and then decorating is required; a significant investment is going to be required.

Two final notes, Councillor Connor laid a wreath at our war memorial on Remembrance Day on behalf of the village, a few residents attended and were able to comfortably social distance for the short service. A contractor will be carrying out works to finally complete the short footpath at the back of the car park in the next couple of months.

We are now moving forward with the many building repairs required at the Hall, money is always a problem but ours is in the safe hands of our treasurer Sarah.

We are looking forward to planning more activities and aim to have 50% occupancy, some suggestions crafts, cookery, dance, exercise, youth work. men's or ladies forum, toddlers group, camera club. None of these activities are possible without your help and support. Other ideas very welcome. This is your hall.

We look forward to a NEW ERA here at the HALL in the coming year. Next meeting Tuesday 8th December 7.00pm at the Village Hall.

Roughlee Parish Council

This News covers the two months including Christmas and the New Year. Whilst I hope that most villagers will have something to look forward to, I expect that we will all be glad to see the back of 2020. Here's hoping for much better things in the new year. One of the sad consequences of the present difficulties was the cancellation of this year's Senior Citizens Christmas Lunch. This is always very well attended and will be returned next year. Meanwhile the Parish Council are looking at things we might do this year to bring a little Christmas cheer as an alternative to the lunch.

November 11th, Remembrance Day, was marked by a small gathering of villagers at the village war memorial. A short video on of the event is available on the village web site.

Whilst we are keeping formal meetings to a minimum the work of the Parish Council continues. We are developing our proposal to designate the riverside opposite the school as a village green. This will change very little as the area is currently maintained by the Parish Council but it will mean that the recreational use of the area which has been enjoyed by generations of villagers will be preserved into the future. Many of you will recall the presentation by the local history society to the Parish Gathering about three years ago. This revealed a number of fascinating facts about the village including the site of ancient mills at Thorneyholme and at Damhead on the site of the school. Work in connection with the footpath gates at Thorneyholme, which are clearly more than standard gates, has led us to do further research relating to village history. This could lead to the development of a Heritage Trail to bring our interesting past to the attention of present and future generations. Sadly, there has been further fly tipping alongside the informal lay-by on Jinny Lane. In this case it appears to be residue from the drugs trade and the usual problems clearing the mess have resulted. It may be a sign of the times but if you see anything untoward please be careful but take note of any vehicle numbers and let us know.

Most of you will know that Mary Reed our Parish Clerk is also the Responsible Financial Officer (RFO) looking after money matters for the Parish Council. Mary works very hard at these dual roles and would like to reduce her burdens to spend more time on other things. We are therefore looking for someone to take on the RFO job. It would suit someone who is interested in Parish affairs and can spare a few hours a month looking after financial matters. Whilst

a background in working with figures would be helpful this is not essential as full induction training will be arranged. The formal handover will be in April 2021 but some earlier integration would be useful. So, back to the present. I hope that by the time you read this Bay Horse will be open again and things will be improving giving us all a better quality of life. I certainly hope so. Meanwhile the Parish Council send their very best good wishes for Christmas and the New Year.

WHEN THE LIGHTS ALL WENT OUT IN EUROPE

Whilst watching the Remembrance Service on TV and the Service at the Cenotaph on Remembrance Sunday my thoughts were drawn back to the Commemoration Service at St.Mary's in 2014 of the 100th anniversary of the start of World War 1.

The service, led by John Hallows, began with some appropriate music at 10.30pm followed 15 minutes later with readings and prayers during which all the lights in the church were switched off until just one candle was alight beside the lectern as 11pm approached. A member of the congregation came forward to extinguish this after which a poem was to be read at the back of the church. As the candle was extinguished the church clock started to chime 11pm after which the poem was read and the service ended.

Had we tried to co-ordinate the timing of the service and the extinguishing of the candle with the chiming of the clock it would have been very difficult, if not impossible.

Many visitors have commented how they have felt a calming presence in St.Mary's when sitting quietly. Was the chiming of the clock at the precise moment the candle went out a coincidence, or could it have been the result of some divine intervention?


