Barley Parish Council

Parish Meeting, Parking, Toilet block, Planning, Roles...

The Annual Parish meeting attracted 40 residents in May and there were presentations from the Women's Institution (Sue Statham), the Village Hall (Tom Cosway), the Chapel (Rosemary Connor) and me on behalf of the Parish Council. All contributors were able to reflect on some of the key events over the last year and their plans for the coming year; it is always fascinating to hear of things you had no idea about.

The Council presented an update on parking management in Barley over the last four years to address congestion and inconsiderate parking (with associated hazards) including the recent introduction on parking enforcement on Cross Lane above the Village Hall, which might be the last piece in the jigsaw but a 20mph speed limit might yet come. An update on projects to improve the village was covered by a slide show along with a finance report, updates on planning issues and the Council outlined future projects for 2026/27 including works on the Turning Area.

The WI reported on various successful events held and a healthy membership number and plans for the WI garden. The Village Hall outlined recent and future improvement projects and requested volunteers to join the committee. The Chapel reported that they now had sufficient membership to keep the chapel open, successful fundraising events and the plans for resolving the dry rot problem in the roof.



We were also pleased to host the Mayor, the Borough and the County Councillor. After the presentations were complete, we had a social event until late in the evening catching up with neighbours, tucking into a good buffet from the Cabin and free drinks. The attendance was down a

bit on previous years but it was a hot day; that said, it is disappointing that those who were available could not find the time to come and join in and show their support for four groups that put such a lot of voluntary time into our village.

The toilet block improvement project has just been completed with the pointing of the gable walls and painting of the shelter, the finishing touches.



Planning Matters – The planning inspectorate have approved planning permission for an extension to Bollard Barn in Whitehough. I anticipate this has been a struggle for Barry and Denise Tombs since 2023 and they have had to adjust their plans along the way, including de-

listing their home and amending designs to get approval in the Conservation Area.

Within the PC we allocate some responsibilities between members to try and share the workload. For the coming year, I have summarised

how some key responsibilities are allocated for your information; each responsibility is shared with another councillor (seconded) to provide support. The main point of contact remains the clerk of the PC who administers and keeps records for the Council, she passes queries on to the relevant Councillor and chases up responses.

During the subsequent discussion, support was expressed for the new repair shop and café in Barley, expanding our current recycling scheme and possibly setting up a residents' food buying group with the wholesale cooperative Suma. At the May Parish Council Meeting, Beccy Murrell was re-elected as Chair and Paul Kavanagh as Vice Chair. The Parish Council would like to express their sincere thanks and gratitude to Councillor Kathleen Wilkinson who stood down as the Goldshaw Booth representative at Barrowford and Western Parishes, a position she has held for over 50 years, since 1974!

Our series of community wellbeing events got off to a great start with Jog In The Park on 10th May – 25 people ran between 1 and 3km, before enjoying refreshments provided by the sponsor Haffners. The next runs are at 10am on Sunday 5th July – you can register at:

jogintheparkgb@hotmail.com and by popular request there is now the option to run 5km (6 laps). We are delighted that Witches Galore has agreed to sponsor our outdoor Tai Chi wellbeing events, which will be taking place in Newchurch on the top playing field by the Pavillion on Sunday 28th June, 2nd August and 6th September. There has been plenty of maintenance undertaken and ongoing around the villages. The first phase of the railings painting at Higher Spen has been completed by Brian Pinder and has greatly improved their appearance – the Parish Council is extremely grateful to Brian for doing such a thorough job – thank you! The Sabden Fold CCTV is now operational with excellent clarity and two formal requests to access incident footage have been actioned. At the toilet block, the notice board is being refurbished, the toilet gutters are being cleared and the broken unisex toilet unit replaced.

On less positive notes, the source of the discharge into the stream at Spenbrook has still not been identified and the Environment Agency is arranging a site meeting with Pendle Borough Council, and a local resident has informed the Parish Council that some malicious damage had occurred to a vehicle whilst parked overnight in the village – please can residents be extra vigilant around their property. Our next meeting is on Monday 8th June, 7pm, at St Mary's Church in Newchurch – please come along for a warm welcome and a cup of tea.

During May we held our annual parish gathering in the village centre. It proved to be a very interesting evening, with talks from Ruth White and Tina Manning about the Repair Shop being held in Barley, currently on a monthly basis. I hadn't realised that this is part of an international

movement, aimed not only at repairs and recycling, but also at promoting the social aspects of community life.

Claire Milligan then told us about the "Lancashire Tweed" project, which aims to secure a fairer deal for local farmers for their sheep

fleeces, with a view to turning them into a true Lancashire Tweed. I offered my services to model any garments on the London catwalks, but for some reason my offer was declined.

We finished the evening with excellent cheese and wine provided by some of the ladies from the village.

As I mentioned during the evening, we are still waiting for a decision on whether we can take full control and ownership of the Village Centre and the associated land from Pendle Council. Encouraging Progress at Barley Chapel Volunteers needed 11th and 13th June

There is encouraging news from Barley Chapel as important restoration work is now set to begin following the award of a generous grant from the Lancashire Environmental Fund.

The funding will enable essential repairs to the Chapel Hall roof, together with treatment for dry rot, helping to preserve and protect this much-valued community building for years to come. Work is scheduled to commence on 15th June, marking an important step forward after much planning and preparation.

Before the contractors can begin, volunteers are needed to help prepare the hall. Assistance would be greatly appreciated on Thursday 11th June, when furnishings will need to be removed from the Chapel Hall, and again on Saturday 13th June to help remove the tiles from the suspended ceiling. Any time and practical help that people can offer will make a real difference.

The Chapel continues to enjoy tremendous support from residents across the local community. In recent months, villagers from Barley, Roughlee and Newchurch have come together to establish a new Repair Café initiative based at the Chapel. The project provides a welcoming place where people can bring items for repair, share practical skills, reduce waste and strengthen community connections. This is an excellent example of how Barley Chapel continues to serve not only as a place of worship, but also as a vibrant and valued community hub. Members of the Chapel are excited to see how the Repair Café and other community activities will continue to grow and develop in the months ahead.

The FOG Club will also continue to meet on 18th and 25th June, with a family treasure hunt planned as part of the activities. These events continue to provide enjoyable opportunities for families and friends to come together and strengthen community friendships. A reminder too that Barley Chapel holds a monthly service on the first Sunday of each month, and everyone is warmly welcome to attend.

We would also like to thank the Parish Council for their continued support and encouragement, which is greatly appreciated by everyone involved with the Chapel.

The support, goodwill and willingness to help shown by so many people reflects the strong sense of community that exists across the villages.

My time at St Mary’s Church began on Christmas Eve of 2024.

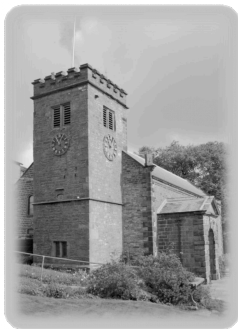

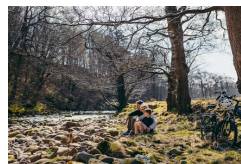

Tracks to Trails

Discover Bowland by Bus, Bike & Train



As summer approaches, now is the perfect time to plan a local adventure. The Forest of Bowland National Landscape team, in partnership with Community Rail Lancashire, recently launched two Eco Escapes itineraries — thoughtfully curated to showcase Bowland's spectacular landscapes,

rich heritage and welcoming hospitality, while championing low-impact travel.

These new routes encourage visitors to leave the car behind and explore Bowland by public transport, with walking and cycling trails that link to bus and rail services.

With downloadable guides, transport information, and recommendations for places to stay and eat, Eco Escapes makes it easy to enjoy Bowland at your own pace — and sustainably.

Itinerary highlights include:

■ Chipping Circular Walk – Discover the historic mill village and its beautiful surrounding countryside.

■ Little Bowland Linear Walk – A 4-mile walk from Chipping to Whitewell, featuring limestone outcrops, ancient woodland and river crossings.

■ Spring Wood Walk – A gentle woodland stroll near Whalley.

■ Pendle Hill Summit Routes – Challenging hikes from Whalley or Clitheroe, rewarded with breathtaking views.

■ Accessible Trail – A Tramper – all terrain wheelchair – is available in Sabden, offering access to Churn Clough Reservoir.

■ Ribble Valley Jubilee Trail – A three-day walking adventure through picturesque countryside.

Richard Watts, Chair of Community Rail Lancashire, said: “We’re thrilled to collaborate with the Forest of Bowland National Landscape on the Eco Escapes itineraries, based from Clitheroe and Whalley stations along the Clitheroe Line. This project promotes sustainable travel and encourages more people to discover this beautiful area by train, bus, bike and on foot.”

Hetty Byrne, Sustainable Tourism Officer for the Forest of Bowland National Landscape, added: “Eco Escapes is all about making it easier for people to get out and enjoy Bowland in a way that’s both rewarding and kind to the environment. Whether you’re hopping on a bus, catching a train, or setting off on foot or by bike, it’s a fantastic way to explore without the car and to connect more deeply with the landscape, wildlife and local businesses.”

New and improved bus connections — including Route 11 — make exploring the Hodder Valley easier than ever, linking circular and linear walks through places such as Slaidburn, Dunsop Bridge, Whitewell, Wigglesworth, Hurst Green and Chipping.

Funded by the Community Rail Network and the DfT Community Rail Development Fund, the itineraries feature fully mapped walking and cycling routes, accessible by public transport. 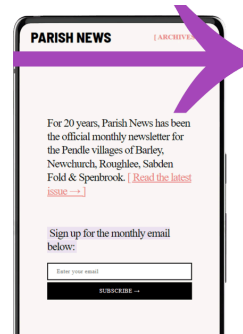
